

Teacher reads aloud one line, students repeat after him/her in chorus. (The first three lines need to be done at a time, the rest of the poem line by line.)


(b) Chain-drill- "You scare the crow."



Summary of the Text:

The poet sees a scarecrow and wants to know its identity. He wants to know if he is the landowner or the scarecrow. He fails to distinguish between them, because the scarecrow wears the landowner's shirt and his pants and holds his bow. Moreover he finds that the scarecrow is doing the job of the landowner. He usually scares the crow, the birds and other animals. So he is confused and asks him to tell him his identity.

Further he notices similarities of the scarecrow and his master in their appearances. The scarecrow is the look-alike of the landowner. He and the landowner seem to be twins. Both of them have the same characteristics. The poet asks him if his landowner is hiding behind him.

The poet usually walks across the land too early. He has no intention to destroy anything in the land or to steal anything from the land. But he finds that the scarecrow takes pleasure in frightening him. His action confuses him. He wants to be clear about the scarecrow's identity. He is still not sure if he is the scarecrow or the landowner.
